Greetings in the name of the one who creates, redeems, and gathers us!

If I'm honest, it was never really just about the chairs. Almost since the day I began my tenure as pastor here at Trinity Lutheran Church, there have been folks asking about replacing the chairs in the Fellowship Hall. The old, gray, fabric chairs had been showing signs of wear and tear for quite some time. Occasionally, you might have heard rumblings around a funeral that it was a little embarrassing to have extended family of a beloved brother or sister in Christ see the chairs in such condition, but when discussions would arise at either Council meetings or some other committee, it always



seemed to devolve into what specific solution would work or not, or which color they should be, or what we would do with the old chairs, or... the list goes on.

Ultimately, it was never totally about the chairs. The chairs that we have acquired in the past month have been a welcome addition, and the old gray chairs have found a new home. What mattered more was a sense of feeling welcome in a space that should always feel welcoming. Church can be like that sometimes: we want so badly to say that the congregation is a welcoming place, but the details can get in the way of achieving that. This isn't unique to Trinity, or even modern churches, as Paul writes:

"For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we might have hope. May the God of steadfastness and encouragement grant you to live in harmony with one another, in accordance with Christ Jesus, so that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God." – Romans 15:4-7, NRSVUE

We are gathered together by the Holy Spirit in weekly gatherings for worship and fellowship, in meetings that happen in the Fellowship Hall and other areas of the building, in sharing meals together for funeral luncheons and Summer Day Camp snacks and lunches. In each of these purposes, we hope to welcome one another as Christ has welcomed us, for the glory of God. At our best, we connect everything we do here at Trinity to our mission statement:

"We are bound in Christian love to strengthen and nurture all through word and sacraments as we work, reach out, and serve in this community."

New chairs are not mentioned anywhere in that statement, but they are a manifestation of our call to provide hospitality and welcome; chairs that might look a little better are a sign of our love to those whom we welcome, a strengthening of the nurturing relationships and a service to this community. While this project may not have been about the chairs, the welcome that we provide one another (and the stranger) is the extension of that welcome of Christ who first welcomes us.

In recent weeks, we have heard lots from the Gospel texts about what the Kingdom of Heaven is like. I would add a new one: the kingdom of heaven is like a place for all to rest and join in fellowship, with chairs that feel inviting.

Help with Fellowship Hall Refresh

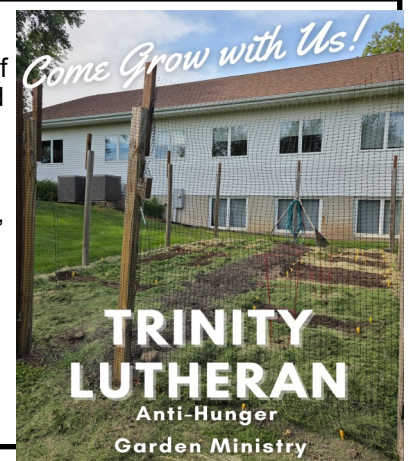

SOME BUZZ

Our Flutter Patch has a connection to our Nation's Birthday!

Really?

Read on

A. The Flutter patch is now the home of 20 different prairie plant species that are all native to southeastern Iowa. All the plants provide support to birds, butterflies, and other Iowa native pollinators (some are host plants for egg laying; some provide food source by nectar, leaf or seed; some provide valuable nesting material).

This is a critical growing season for all that has been planted to date. The first growing season is the season the plants must adapt to the soil and develop their roots. They must develop to the point that they can withstand drought, out-compete unwanted weeds, and withstand the Iowa winter. Next spring and summer will be the real test of success in the planting garden.



B. One prairie plant now found in the Flutter Patch is a shrub commonly called **New Jersey Tea**. Its native range runs from New England west to the Rocky Mountains, and from southern Canada south to the Gulf Coast. The shrub grows to a mature height and width of 2-3 feet. While the shrub is quite small, it develops a taproot that can be as wide as the shrub, and will drill more than 15 feet into the subsoil. When it reaches maturity, the shrub will bloom white flowers from June to August each year.

The name **New Jersey Tea** derives from its use by colonists. If you are an American history buff, you may recall that in May 1773, the British Parliament passed the infamous Tea Act, imposing a tax on all tea imported by the British colonies. The Tea Act was one grievance that led to our declaration of the independence from Britain. Remember the Boston Tea Party and the slogan "no taxation without representation"? Both derived as a protest against the Tea Act, as did a general boycott against imported tea. As part of the boycott, colonists brewed leaves from the New Jersey Tea as an alternative to "ordinary" tea.

Interestingly, the British Parliament did not repeal the Tea Act (and resulting tax on tea) until August 1861 - four months after the Confederate capture of Fort Sumter, that is widely recognized as the beginning of the Civil War.



C. From this September through 2027 (and perhaps 2028), I hope to expand our current Flutter Patch through the median, to include an additional 17 or 18 prairie plants that are native to Southeastern Iowa. Please pray for continued success.

I would also thankfully accept help from anyone who may be willing. Please consider asking me how you might be able to help in some way. I encourage all to be curious, not shy. Do not underestimate the help you may be able to provide in this project. Together, we may be able to find a way that you can help (for example, adopting one or two small plants - or a small patch of plants - that you could care for without undertaking general garden maintenance. You might even find some small help to be an interesting and useful experience. You won't know until you try. Thanks to all those who have provided help in the past.

An Invitation from Bishop Current

Dear Ones of the Southeastern Iowa Synod,

As members of the ELCA, we have the gift of the Holy Scriptures, the Confessions, the powerful activity of the Holy Spirit, and the gift of a denomination that is committed to study related to issues that are important to our lives of faith. The ELCA publishes the work of Social Statement task forces (made up of lay and ordained members of our church nominated to engage in prayer, learning, and dialogue after a call/vote from the Churchwide Assembly), studies provided to the whole denomination and related surveys to garner feedback from the whole church, and then finally the published (after ELCA Church Council and Churchwide Assembly positive votes) as social teachings: Social statements (Churchwide Assembly- adopted policies), Social messages (topical ELCA Church Council documents addressing pressing issues, and Social policy resolutions (ELCA Church Council or Churchwide Assembly actions that express a position on a specific social question at a particular time.) I would like to clarify some misconceptions related to ELCA social teachings that I hear often:

- ELCA social teachings do not represent the whole ecology of the ELCA membership.

ELCA social teachings emerge from the Churchwide Assembly which is the largest legislative body in our denomination. There are task forces for the development and reconsideration of social statements that deliberately represent our church's representational principles. ELCA members are offered feedback opportunities in each social statement process.

- ELCA social teachings are written by academics in Chicago and do not include the voices of regular ELCA members.

Social Statement Task forces consist of lay members and rostered ministers from the diversity of contexts throughout the ELCA. Task forces are supported by the Theological Ethics staff in the Office of the Presiding Bishop. Task forces follow a regular process of prayer, study, community building, and reaching out to the larger church for feedback through their work.

- ELCA social teachings are written without input from the whole church.

Social statements are developed through the mandate of the Churchwide Assembly and follow a process for development that is often a multi-year process for a task force to discern. This Process always includes collecting feedback from constituencies throughout the church and a public study and survey.

ELCA social teaching task forces are hand-picked and there is no room for a diversity of opinions.

Social Statement task forces are publicized, and nominations are invited for these task forces. The effort is always to follow the ELCA representational principles for fullest possible engagement across the church as well as a diversity of opinions and experiences for full and robust discernment.

Typically, when ELCA members talk with me about these misconceptions or other concerns related to our social teachings, I encourage them to go and read more about our social teachings and even dig into the Social Statements and Social Messages. I expect that most are surprised by the deliberate grounding in scripture, Lutheran theology, and the careful and clear communication of how each social matter intersects with our faith.

We have an opportunity now to engage in a Social Statement reconsideration process. I invite you to take this invitation seriously. I encourage you to share this information with your congregation, your pastor, your deacon, and make plans to invite the congregation to participate. You might lead the study called "Conscience and Conversation: A Study During the Reconsideration of the Social Statement Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust," and then invite responses to the survey (included in the study), which is open until September 30, though additional questions and feedback can be sent to the task force at Reconsiderations@elca.org.
